# **Major Industrial Projects**

## Introduction

This report is a follow-up to the November, 1995 report, "Major Industrial Projects In Northern Alberta." These reports look at both the magnitude of major industrial investment and the state of the construction industry in northern Alberta to gauge the performance of the northern economy.

Information on the state of the construction industry comes from a number of interviews with municipal officials and industry representatives from across northern Alberta. The major industrial investment portion of the report is based primarily on the "Inventory of Major Industrial Projects" produced by Alberta Economic Development and Tourism (ED&T), with additional information from a National Oil sands Task Force news release of June 3, 1996.

The overall outlook, from this information, is positive. Construction industry representatives look forward to steady, if not spectacular, growth over the next few years. This optimism is borne out by the level of investment planned for the rest of the decade.

## **Construction Industry**

## **General Trends**

- The provincial outlook remains positive, according to the Alberta Construction Association (ACA). Their prediction of 5.5 to 6% growth in the construction industry for 1995 proved reasonably close and they continue to look for about 2% growth for each of the next four years.
- Throughout the province, residential construction leads the industry. In the North, industrial developments are also making a strong impact.
- The large amount of new investment indicated does not signify a building boom in northern Alberta but rather several years of steady growth. Many of the projects listed are in the planning stages and will not begin construction for two or three years.

## **Construction Outlook by Area**

#### Grande Prairie

Residential construction continues to be the busiest segment of the industry in this area. Housing has been a steady market for the past several years. Many in the industrial construction sector have hopes for the Grande Alberta Paper (GAP) project, but construction on that will not begin for another two years, pending an environmental review.

Commercial construction is a point of frustration for local contractors. Several "big box" retail chains have built, or are building, stores in Grande Prairie. According to the Grande Prairie Construction Association however, 95% of the construction of those stores is going to Edmonton-based contractors.

## Peace River

Construction activity in this area has fallen off slightly in recent years, with no strong economic driver. The low price of pulp has resulted in a delay in the planned expansion of Daishowa-Marubeni International's Peace River Pulp plant. Nonetheless, housing starts have remained stable.

As in Grande Prairie, Peace River area contractors see jobs going to outsiders. In this case, a wastewater treatment plant is being built by an Edmonton contractor.

## Slave Lake

Residential construction has dominated the construction industry in and around Slave Lake recently, peaking in 1994. While housing remains strong in Municipal District 124, it is tailing off in town, with commercial building looking stronger for the next two years. Institutional construction fluctuates widely but has often been a major part of the construction business in Slave Lake.

## Lloydminster

Lloydminster is a hub for the oil and gas service industry and, as such, has benefitted significantly from oil patch expansion. While there is little direct industrial construction in the town; residential building, and commercial building and renovations are increasing. The Lloydminster Construction Association looks forward to at least two more years of steady growth in the industry.

## Fort McMurray

The construction industry in the Fort McMurray area is very strong and is hopeful for the future, thanks largely to the activity in the Oil sands. More than \$3 billion in investments over the next ten years will provide steady employment in industrial construction rather than a short "boom". Residential construction in Fort McMurray is particularly strong and should remain so for the next two years. Housing starts have risen from 22 in 1995 to 100 in 1996 with 120 - 160 predicted for 1997 and similar numbers for 1998. In addition, a 100-unit apartment building is under development; the first rental project in 10 years in the city. An important factor in the growing residential market is the plan by Suncor and Syncrude to scale down their on-site work camps. These camps now house close to 2,000 workers and are being reduced to about 300, creating a demand for housing in Fort McMurray.

Commercial construction in Fort McMurray is likely to tail off slightly following the recent completion of several major retail stores. The largest developments being considered currently are two or three possible hotels, with 50 to 100 units each.

# Workforce Concerns

- Contacts in many areas reported frequent shortages of qualified tradespeople. For example, sheet metal workers and plumbers were noted as being in short supply in the Grande Prairie area.
- While brief, seasonal shortages of tradespeople are common, the predicted growth in


large industrial projects will likely compound the problem. Even so, the Alberta Construction Association expects that the shortages will only last as long as it takes tradespeople from across Canada to move to Alberta.

• Recent changes in apprenticeship funding may be creating trades shortages. In the past, Unemployment Insurance funds paid apprentices while they were away from their jobs to complete the course portions of their training. That funding is no longer available, making it difficult for apprentices to complete their training.

These concerns suggest that it may be helpful for colleges and industry to cooperate in order to ensure that there are both a supply of qualified tradespeople for industry, and jobs for Alberta workers.

## **Major Industrial Projects.**

The following information is based on the Inventory of Major Alberta Projects produced by Alberta Economic Development and Tourism. Up to July 1995, these reports included projects with a capital cost of \$20 million or more. For the August, 1996 report, the list was expanded to include those valued at \$2 million or more.



#### Major Industrial Projects in Northern Alberta

Annual investment totals include all projects listed in the ED&T inventories and located at least partially in the NADC area. The 1996 figure includes \$126.4 million worth of projects valued between \$2 million and \$20 million, and \$2.7 billion worth of new or expanded Oil sands investments. The following table does not include recently completed projects such as the Tolko Industries OSB plant in High Prairie, which do appear on the ED&T inventory.
